## b. **Finance:** Marietta Doney

- Staff and MSI managed the conference budget for great savings this year, including bidding A/V through an RFP that saved about \$50k. The conference met its minimum attendees goal, which helped to nearly break even on budget.
- During this difficult year for our network, membership and sponsorship contributions have increased.
- NEUAC is doing well financially. Compared to 2024, Total Assets increased, Total Liabilities decreased, and Total Equity increased.

#### c. Conference: Kim Campbell Hailey, Elizabeth Moore

- 2025 Conference highlights:
  - Total attendees, including onsite registrations: 652
    - Near-final registration counts by organization type: Nonprofits 308,
       Government 105, Tribe 41, Utility 153, Corporation 35
  - Important plenary speakers:
    - Professor and author Diana Hernandez
    - Dialogue with the Feds (HHS staff joining remotely)
  - Annual membership meeting to feature policy update to all members.
  - o Baseball event and NoDa Night networking opportunity have tickets available
- Call for Seattle Conference Co-Chairs: Katrina Metzler

#### d. **Membership/Fundraising:** Mike Bradford

- NEUAC's board has been instrumental to increase the membership and fundraising of the organization.
- Exceeded 2025 goals:
  - \$513k sponsorships raised, compared to goal of \$490k. Includes 4 new sponsors, 3 returning after a lapse, and 10 that increased amounts vs. 2024.
  - Membership reached 296 members, compared to goal of 285, with 90% retention rate and 30 new members.
- Ideas were discussed to help increase membership and maintain retention.

## e. Public Policy & Advocacy: Kate Brownlee and Ben Jackson

- April 1st saw staffing cuts in HHS, including the LIHEAP team. Nonetheless, HHS
  was able to release balance 10% of FY25 funding in April.
- President's "skinny budget" proposed LIHEAP to be eliminated.
- NEUAC and partners continue to engage with Congress and educate staff and Members on LIHEAP.

- House and Senate Appropriations Committees activity:
  - NEUAC, EEI and AGA submitted language to the committees. NEUAC will submit testimony for an upcoming Senate Appropriations meeting.
  - LIHEAP was mentioned several times in the three hearings of both Senate and House with HHS, reflecting our network's effective advocacy. JFK, Jr. stated support to release LIHEAP funding if it is appropriated by Congress.
  - Appropriations meetings have also been encouraging. They continue to reference the bipartisan support, and don't expect budget to be eliminated, but do anticipate cuts to the program.
  - Markups forthcoming: House Subcommittee July 21st and full committee July 24, when we first expect to see specific funding figures and language.
- Questions/Comments:
  - Katrina visited JEA in Florida to provide a policy update and coordinate about congressional committees' support to LIHEAP.
  - AGA and EEI have set up meetings for Katrina to provide education and advocacy in both House and Senate offices.
  - Reconciliation is not expected to have a high impact on LIHEAP. LIHEAP is a discretionary program, and reconciliation affects non-discretionary spending.

    - o Helping legislators make a connection between fuel and electricity.
    - o Impact to low income customers from energy increases due to Al
    - Housing eviction and Energy assistance
  - For tribes that aren't federally recognized, if LIHEAP goes away, there will not be assistance to heat homes.
  - Municipal utilities should be part of the conversation about the work that needs to be done, and how can they be part of the conversation
- Utility representatives shared about their advocacy to protect the programs.
  - Community Action Agencies recommended that utilities partner with the CAA State Associations for advocacy. CSGB should also be discussed.
- NEUAC Senior Fellows / Alumni:
  - Consider gathering retirees to add support when contracted services needed.
  - Discussion:
    - This is an interim solution until NEUAC is in a position to hire an FTE.
    - Good idea financially to access experience in the field and mentorship.
    - Is there a possibility to extend to previous members who are not retired?
    - Proposed name: VOLT: Volunteers Offering Leadership Talent
    - Alumni should not be board members, to avoid conflict of interest.
